SECTION A - READING (10 MARKS)

Q1. Read the following passage and answer the questions that follow.

1 Swaminathan walked out of the examination hall after handing in the last exam paper. Standing on the verandah, with his shoulder resting against the wall, he looked into the hall and saw his friends Sankar and Rajam still writing. Mani was scratching his chin with the pen. "No, maybe just thirty-five," replied Sankar modestly. Mani said, "Liar! If you get a first class, can I cut off your tuft?"

8 Just then the bell rang again and everyone assembled in the school hall looking happy and relieved. Even the teachers were friendly and pleasant. Mr Ebenezer, seeing Mani, asked, "Hello, blockhead, how are you going to waste your vacation?"

Mani replied, "I'm going to sleep, sir," and then winked at his friends. When the teacher asked him whether he would improve his head by the time he returned to school, Mani said, "Impossible, sir, unless you cut off Sankar's head and put it in place of mine!" This was greeted with roars of laughter.

9 The Headmaster came on to the stage and made a short speech when the noise subsided. He said the school would remain closed till the nineteenth of June and reopen on the twentieth. He hoped that the boys would not waste their time, but read storybooks and glance through their books for the next class, to which he hoped most of them would be promoted. He ended his speech with a prayer. As soon as the prayer ended there was a storm of joyous cries, and the students rushed out of the hall.
